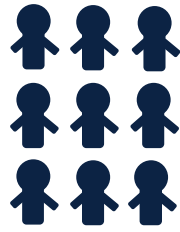

The virtual format of our events allowed us to bring in speakers that we may not otherwise be able to host due to distance or travel time. Having our events online also encouraged people from across the country to attend. Some of our events had record attendance this year. In particular, the annual J. Donald Mawhinney Lecture in Professional Ethics welcomed over 200 participants.
