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Assessment Details & Mark Allocations

Indigenous Settler Legal Relations Assessment:

Critical Self-Reflection – Pass/Fail. 30% of final grade. **Final Paper** – Graded. 75% of final grade

Legal Research & Writing Assessment:

Participation – Graded on a pass/fail basis. If a student fails the participation component, their final mark in the course will be reduced by 3%. Information about what is required to achieve a passing participation grade will be provided by each LRW instructor in the course syllabus.

Assignment 1 – Graded on a pass/fail basis where the passing threshold is 64% (C+). If a student fails the assignment, they must redo the assignment based on instructor feedback. The redone assignment will be due one week after the original assignment is returned to the student. If a student fails the redone assignment, their final mark in the course will be reduced by 5%.

Assignment 2 – 100% of total mark in the course (subject to Participation and Assignment 1 assessment outcomes).

Criminal Factum & Moot Assessment:

Criminal Law Factum & Moot Assessment: This is a pass/fail assignment. Students will work in pairs and be marked primarily on their assigned issue, but consideration will also be given to the joint areas of the factum. Where a student receives a failing mark for their factum, they must meet with their professor and then redraft the relevant section of the factum. The student's redrafted section is due ten days after the factum is returned to the class. If the redrafted factum is not of passing quality, the student will continue to work with their professor and resubmit their factum until a passing mark is achieved. The moot is not formally graded but all first year students are required to complete all aspects of the first year mooting program – including factum writing and oral advocacy. Students who are unable to attend their moot due to illness or require an accommodation should contact the Manager, Student Experience, Barbara Wang.

Transnational Assessment:

Written Assignment (100% of the total mark).

Introduction to Public Law & the Charter

Final Examination (95%) and Pass/Fail Participation Assessment (5%). The format of of the participation assessment varies by instructor.

December Practice Exams in Full-Year courses:

If the December Practice Exam Mark in a full-year course is less than or equal to the April Exam Mark, then the April Exam mark equals the Overall Exam Mark. Otherwise, if the December Practice Exam Mark is greater than the April Exam Mark, then 25% of the December Practice Exam Mark plus 75% of the April Exam Mark equals the Overall Exam Mark.
