

WILSON MOOT 2024-2025 Application Fact Sheet

Note: This document provides information regarding the application process for a 2024-2025 position with the Wilson Moot. For additional information regarding the Wilson Moot, please see their Program Description on the Allard Law Upper Year Moots webpage.

1. Application Package

Students must include the following materials in their application package:

- (a) 🖂 Legal Writing Sample
- (b) \boxtimes Completion of the In-Person Moot Tryout
- (c) \square Completion of the Mandatory Experiential Application Survey
- (d) ⊠ Other: Résumé (2 pages max, see additional instructions on <u>Allard Law Upper Year</u> <u>Moots webpage.</u>))

Please see the <u>Allard Law Upper Year Moots webpage</u> for additional guidance on preparing these materials. All application package materials should be submitted via <u>ACE</u>. All experiential opportunities are labelled "ExL 2024 - 2025: Moot Name" on ACE.

2. Grades

The Wilson Moot will review the following grades in their recruitment process:

- (a) ⊠ Law school grades that are available up to the date of the Application Deadline will be reviewed
- (b) \Box Law school grades will NOT be reviewed

If Option A is Selected:

Students must include a copy of their Allard Law Transcript in their application package.

- The Transcript must be an official copy (Note: There is a cost associated with <u>ordering a</u> <u>Transcript</u>. Transcripts can take 2-4 business days to process.)
- In the Transcript does not need to be an official copy. A PDF of the Grades Summary generated through the Student Service Centre is sufficient (Note: The Grades Summary does not list course titles).

If Option B is Selected:

The Wilson Moot will not receive access to students' law school grades. A student who <u>only</u> applies to the Wilson Moot and does not apply to any other Allard Law experiential learning program that collects grades (including clinic and externship programs), will not have their law school grades collected or distributed to any experiential learning programs.



3. Compatibility with Clinic and Externship Programs

- (a) \Box Students may participate in a clinic or externship and the Wilson Moot at the same time.
- (b) □ Students should consult the Wilson Moot if they receive an offer from a clinic or externship and wish to participate in those programs at the same time as participating in the Wilson Moot. The appropriate contact for this purpose is Enter the name and email address of the contact person here.
- (c) ⊠ Students may <u>not</u> participate in a clinic or externship and the Wilson Moot at the same time.

Note: In addition to the above notations, students cannot participate in the Wilson Moot and in the Indigenous Community Legal Clinic, the Judicial Externship, the Rise Women's Legal Centre, or the WSÁNEĆ law field course in the same academic year.

4. Program Schedule Overview

Students are responsible for managing their time and are expected to be fully engaged while participating in the program. Students should plan their affairs accordingly given the program schedule below:

The program begins with some assigned reading over the summer, and meetings in September and October, where students will receive instruction in factum drafting and oral argument. Students will have opportunities to practice these skills before the problem is released in November. Students will then draft their factums, which are due at the end of January, and then practice oral arguments in preparation for the competition in late February.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION RE: GRADES COLLECTION AND DISTRIBUTION

1. Do I need to include my law school grades in my application?

All moots have their own application requirements that are set out in their fact sheets. Students should carefully review each program's fact sheet to determine whether law school grades are required to apply.

2. I did not apply for a program that requires grades. Who will get access to my grades?

If you did <u>NOT</u> apply to any experiential learning program that requires grades, your grades will not be provided to any experiential learning programs.



3. I have concerns about providing my law school grades to an experiential learning program. What should I do?

Grades are only one component of application packages. Often, grades are just used by a program as a source of additional information about a student's interest in an area of law or as a general indication of their academic progression. You do not need to have exceptional grades to be considered a strong applicant.
