Allard School of Law – Continuing Student Awards - 2024/2025

Eligibility

- 1. You are a continuing student in the UBC Juris Doctor Degree program.
- You meet the terms for awards eligibility set out in <u>UBC's Regulations Governing</u> <u>University Awards</u>. Please read these Regulations carefully as they contain rules which may affect your eligibility to earn or keep an award.
- 3. You meet the criteria of one or more of the awards set out herein.
- 4. Note for **awards where academic merit is the sole criteria**, or which list academic excellence or academic achievement as a key criterion, or which are renewable, the following requirements apply. You will:
 - have completed at least 24 credits in the 2023W session (*);
 - have achieved an average of at least 75% (with no failed or incomplete courses) in the 2023W session; and
 - Registered in at least 24 credits in the 2024W session.
- For awards which rely on any combination of academic and non-academic merit, the minimum GPA credit restriction requirements do not apply. Examples of non-academic merits are leadership, community involvement, varsity athletics, financial need etc.
 - Awards which do not require a minimum of 75% average and enrolment in 24 credits in the 2023W session are indicated in this awards application by the notation "Non-Academic Award".

The determination of whether an award is academic or non-academic is made by Enrolment Services.

- *In some cases, you can be eligible for an academic merit award with a reduced credit load. To be given consideration, submit the following with your application:
 - a letter that describes your situation; or
 - if you are a student who is taking a reduced course load at the recommendation of the Centre for Accessibility you should include a note from your Accessibility Advisor to this effect.
