

JULIUS ALEXANDER ISAAC MOOT 2025-2026 Application Fact Sheet

Note: This document provides information regarding the application process for a 2025-2026 position with the Julius Alexander Isaac Moot ("Isaac Moot"). For additional information regarding the Isaac Moot, please see their Program Description on the <u>Allard Law Upper Year Moots webpage</u>.

1. Application Package

Students must include the	ollowing materials in their	application package:
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- (a) | Legal Writing Sample
- (b) Completion of the In-Person Moot Tryout
- (c) ⊠ Completion of the Mandatory Experiential Application Survey
- (d) Other: Enter any other required materials here.

Please see the <u>Allard Law Upper Year Moots webpage</u> for additional guidance on preparing these materials. All application package materials should be submitted via <u>ACE</u>. All experiential opportunities are labelled "ExL 2025 - 2026: Moot Name" on ACE.

2. Grades

The Isaac Moot will review the following grades in their recruitment process:

- (a) 🖾 Law school grades that are available up to the date of the Application Deadline will be reviewed
- (b) Law school grades will NOT be reviewed

If Option A is Selected:

Students must include a copy of their official Allard Law Transcript in their application package.

If Option B is Selected:

The Isaac Moot will not receive access to students' law school grades. A student who <u>only</u> applies to the Isaac Moot and does not apply to any other Allard Law experiential learning program that collects grades (including clinic and externship programs), will not have their law school grades collected or distributed to any experiential learning programs.



3. Compatibility with Clinic and Externship Programs

(a)	Students may participate in a clinic or externship and the Isaac Moot at the same time.
(b)	${oxedign}$ Students should consult the Isaac Moot if they receive an offer from a clinic or externship

(c)	\square Students may <u>not</u> participate in a clinic or externship and the Isaac Moot at the same
	time.

Note: In addition to the above notations, students cannot participate in the Isaac Moot and in the Indigenous Community Legal Clinic, the Judicial Externship, the Rise Women's Legal Centre, or the WSÁNEĆ law field course in the same academic year.

4. Program Schedule Overview

Students are responsible for managing their time and are expected to be fully engaged while participating in the program. Students should plan their affairs accordingly given the program schedule below:

The Isaac moot is unique. The moot problem always raises issues of equity and diversity (such as how criminal sentencing should account for anti-Black racism), and student factums must make critical race theory arguments. No other moot incorporates legal theory in a comparable manner. Hosted by the Black Law Students' Association (BLSA), this moot prioritizes racial and social justice in legal argument. Some spots will be reserved for students with lived experiences of racialization and diversity. Black law students are encouraged to apply.

The timeline for the Isaac moot is tight. For that reason, we prepare over the summer and early fall by learning about critical race theory. During these early months, students will be asked to read and write response memos. The moot problem generally drops in late October. Written factums are due at the beginning of January (we will work over winter break!). Student travel will be required as the moot is typically held at the beginning of February in Toronto at the Ontario Court of Appeal. Students should expect to work hardest during the second half of the fall term and the first half of the spring term.



ADDITIONAL INFORMATION RE: GRADES COLLECTION AND DISTRIBUTION

1. Do I need to include my law school grades in my application?

All moots have their own application requirements that are set out in their fact sheets. Students should carefully review each program's fact sheet to determine whether law school grades are required to apply.

2. I did not apply for a program that requires grades. Who will get access to my grades?

If you did <u>NOT</u> apply to any experiential learning program that requires grades, your grades will not be provided to any experiential learning programs.

3. I have concerns about providing my law school grades to an experiential learning program. What should I do?

Grades are only one component of application packages. Often, grades are just used by a program as a source of additional information about a student's interest in an area of law or as a general indication of their academic progression. You do not need to have exceptional grades to be considered a strong applicant.
